Do you have a bomb?

It is the normal daily life here: Before entering a shopping center you meet security staff dressed in military uniforms. They check you with a beeper and search the bags. If you enter by car they will search that as well. Meanwhile we even have to leave the car while they search it. You sometimes feel like entering an airport ②. Why? Since quite some time Kenia is receiving many terror treats. Example: About 3 weeks ago a car bomb was discovered and disarmed in Mombasa (coastal region in Kenva) that would have destroyed a five story building!

Conclusion: The general safety level is not too well... Many people will go shopping quickly and they don't like to spend time at public places. You never know if Westgate might be repeated...

Violence and reactions

On Sunday, March 23rd at 10:30 am several armed men carrying AK47s attacked a church in Mombasa. 4 people died and around 20 were injured. Tonight someone threw a grenade into a bus in a Somali district of Nairobi. 7 dead, 30 injured. A few days before 2 people were killed there with a grenade. People are getting impatient and - other than when attacking Christians you don't hear much about forgiveness and loving your enemies. People are angry and start attacking Somali etc. 4 Moslem leaders were killed by unknown men. Those are times when it becomes difficult for

the Christians not to pick up weapons in order to defend themselves. Jesus gave us an example to love our enemies, to bless them and forgive them. That often goes above and beyond our human strength and thoughts. That's why we need Him and His strength in us and in our thoughts... in order to act in the right way when situations like that arise!

Kenya's Vice President (committed Christian) and pastor of the church in Mombasa emphasizes the importance of forgiving the terrorists, which in this case are Moslems.

More politics in Kenya

Many hear about terrorist attacks and the insecurity in this country. Yet something entirely different happened a short while ago: Instead of asking for higher salaries, the President as well as Vice President reduced their salaries. That gave an example for the other government officials and resulted in a huge discussion. At the end – thank God – they agreed on reduced salaries, which is a huge step and has never happened in Kenya so far...

Many people in Kenya love God and pray for their government.

What are we to do with Immanuel?

Immanuel is three years old and the youngest of Athieng's five children. He is getting more and more difficult and sometimes even aggressive. Athieng has a handicap and walks on crutches. Immanuel attends our school, but cannot be taught. Several times he ran away and was found several kilometers away. Sometimes he screams for a long time. We don't know what the problem is. We have been praying and asking questions. He is probably suffering from a handicap (maybe autism). Now

we have found an affordable examination in order to receive advise from professionals. As many other things here in Africa, that will take a while. The appointment is in May. So far we have had traumatized children, but we were able to help them by building trust, by loving them and God worked within their lives and gave inner healing. A child like Immanuel is new to us. Yet we want to help those children as well, before they end up receiving help in form of locking them

The situation in South Sudan

South Sudan is still in the middle of a civil war. At one time the rebels, at another time the government forces will conquer an area. As of late more and more government soldiers desert even in Wau – the origin of many people we work with. It is said that around one million people fled their homes. Both parties want power, but internationally – and that's how the war is funded – the reason for the war is oil, which is abundantly available in South Sudan.

During the Christmas season we were able to distribute clothes and food to the Sudanese in our church who are coming from very poor background. As of late after the service, the people from our church are attending a trauma healing ministry we helped organize in another church. Those trauma healing meetings are very important, because many Sudanese are still suffering from emotional injuries they received during the war and their refugee time. Thank God for the professionals taking care of them, now.
