
Chimoio, Manica Moçambique Deutschland

Ever since my first arrival in this country's capital, Maputo, in November 2002, I have seen and learnt a lot. At first I worked with Iris ministries, at that time a big orphanage with 500 children, in their adult and baby clinic. There were times when I would lead it. From April 2003 until September 2004 I worked with Katie in a project for women and minor girls living in prostitution in the capital. I kept working as a nurse at the Iris Ministry clinic, with children and adults, local workers, villagers and visitors.

In 2006 God guided me 1,200km north, to Chimoio in the Manica Province, where I worked in a ministry as a nurse for one year and later under Tracy's leadership with Africa 180 until today.


From July 2012 until July 2015 I was the leader of the baby clinic, which Natalie took over. I returned at the end of November 2015 until April 2016 to work for absent missionaries at the baby clinic, in the kitchen and administration.

Visiting Iris ministries – I visited their clinic and later the provincial hospital as well as a private clinic.

That was very expensive as well... The Insurance paid for her treatment.

A friend of mine got very sick with pain and high fever in addition to an anaphylactic shock due to unnecessary and incorrectly applied medication — she was flown out to Johannesburg, SA, after 43 hours, where she had an appendix operation. I was heavily involved through many phone calls with international employers, the insurance and the airline for the emergency flight and I am very happy that it all ended so well — a blessing!

A very good South African doctor cared for her for the last 23 hours.

Last year was an exciting time for me, while – among other things – I spent nearly three months in the USA to look at Christian Farms ant their riding therapy. God confirmed that I should proceed towards that kind of riding therapy for special needs children in Mozambique – it will be healing through the time with the animals, but also a protected place, where children can simply be and learn by playing.

Riding therapy with children:




It is about quality time with children and mothers, team prayer and that Jesus will be glorified. The creature horse won't be the center, but means to an end. Healing and renewal can take place, self esteem is strengthened – also by slowly building relationships, playing, teaching Mozambican co workers etc. I keep remembering touching moments from my time in the USA, as well as a few years ago with children and horses, here.

Just touching the soft coat, the presence of the big, quiet animal gave impulses to laugh or make speaking noises, mother or grandmother were amazed by the spontaneous reaction and started to open up, to talk or to just enjoy her usually refused child (Everything is a "curse" here and witchcraft the root of every problem in life).

Those were special moments for me, where I experienced more of God by being together,

the openness was tangible, it was easier to reach people.



The positive changes through animals, especially horses, are commonly known. Coordination improves, balance, the way of walking imitates the human walk. Also autistic children learn to speak better or speak at all through stimulation while riding or handling horses.

Even tense legs or feet, cramped hands, closed fists relax while sitting on a horse.

There are networks of similar ministries in and around Lichanga. I met an English doctor who has been travelling distant villages by bike! for the last 15 years to treat patients with epilepsy or to teach about the sickness and to improve living conditions.


She confirmed that – just like in our area – patients often don't receive medication and are slightly or moderately handicapped by frequent seizures. Underlying sicknesses are malaria, perinatal hypoxia, meningitis etc. Epilepsy can be inherited as well.

I also met a couple that works in a Christian orphanage. The wife is a physiotherapist. She told me about children with special needs (often developed through malaria, meningitis, TB, HIV, alcohol abuse and a lack of oxygen during birth or inherited symptoms), there are many more children like that, needing treatment or any kind of positive attention.

The mothers need to be taught accordingly, so they can have hope for their children. If mothers or caregivers meet, it is already a great encouragement, because exchange happens by itself. I have experienced that while working in the baby program. I want to be there for them as well and support them.

Working as a nurse in existing programs is important for me as well. And then there will be language studies as well, there are three local tribes (Yao, Njinja, Macua), the biggest group are the Yao, mainly unreached, Moslem-animistic.

Childlike faith, step by step.



I am experiencing a new dependency towards God. It is very exciting and challenging. His faithfulness is overwhelming.

Thank you from my heart – I am planning to be in Germany from the beginning of July until the end of August. I'm looking forward to meeting with you!
